Beloved in Christ:

The Tenebrae service (service of the shadows) has been observed by the Christian Church from early times. The service commemorates Christ's institution of the Lord's Supper, his betrayal, trial and death. During the service the Church is gradually darkened, symbolising the extinguishing of the Light of the world, Jesus Christ.

The latter part of the service features the reading of the Shadow Passages. After each of the first six passages, a candle is extinguished. There is a pause and the Kyrie is said.

The Kyrie is:

Minister: Lord have mercy

Congregation: CHRIST HAVE MERCY

After the "Shadow of Death" reading, and the extinguishing of the last candle, the Kyrie is not said. Since there is no benediction, the extinguishing of the final candle marks the close of the service. Feel no pressure to leave the Church immediately after the service; the ministers will not be waiting at the door. Please respect the quietness at the end of the service, and leave in silence.

This service is shared by the people of Knox Church, the people of Durham Street Methodist Church, and the people of St Mark's Methodist Church. Each church has an open table policy. You are welcome to receive communion here. It is good that you are here tonight. May God bless you as you worship.

The Service

Call to Prayer

We are called to remember the Lord Jesus, how he moved among us with kindness and dignifying grace. We are called to remember how he invited his people to a table, where he shared with them from the bounty of God's goodness. What he had received, so to them he gave. Having loved them, he loved them to the end.

And so in a few moments of silence let us still ourselves as we prepare to enter the story that reaches back cross time trusting in the Spirit of God to be our guide.

The Scripture Lesson: 1 Corinthians 11: 23-26

For I received from the Lord what I also handed on to you, that the Lord Jesus on the night when he was betrayed took a loaf of bread, and when he had given thanks, he broke it and said, 'This is my body that is for you.

Prayer:

Holy God, this meal that we share today is the celebration of love – love that becomes visible through the life of Jesus who graced lives with healing and hope, compassion and power and whose love, life, healing and hope, compassion and power continue to permeate even now.

The Institution

On the night of his betrayal, as he sat at the dinner table with his friends, Jesus broke bread and said:

"Take and eat; this is my body which is given for you. Remember me each time you do this."

After they had eaten, he took the cup, gave it to them and said: "Drink this, it is my life poured out for you and for all.

It is the beginning of a new relationship with God."

GOD CAME TO US IN JESUS. THIS SAME GOD IS PRESENT WITH US NOW. AND GOD WILL ALWAYS BE FOR US THE GOD OF JESUS. Now that the hour is come, we pray God, that you will send your Spirit upon these gifts: this bread and this cup. By the mystery of this bread and drink may we come to share in the divinity of Christ who humbled himself to share in our humanity.

The Invitation

Come to this table, not because you must but because you may, not because you are strong, but because you are weak.

Come, not because any goodness of your own gives you a right to come, but because you need mercy and help.

Come, because you love the Lord a little and would like to love Him more. Come, because He loved you and gave Himself for you.

Come and receive the gifts of God.

The Distribution

Please come forward to the table, receive some bread, dip it in the grape juice, and, once you have finished, return to your seat.
