

WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. Prayer of Approach

As the Lenten journey begins, we pray the light and freedom of God for our pilgrim path. LEAD US, O CREATOR, LEAD US O'ER THE WORLD'S TEMPESTUOUS SEA.

For along this path we will hear stories of slavery, tales of our forbears in faith crying out for freedom. GUARD US, GUIDE US, KEEP US, FEED US, FOR WE HAVE NO HELP BUT THEE.

We will witness Moses discerning that he cannot be indifferent to the plight of the people, **BUT NEEDS TO MOVE WITH COURAGE AND CONVICTION.** We will hear Jesus calling us to find greatness through service, to become like him **AS HE OFFERS HIMSELF AS A RANSOM FOR MANY.**

Should we feel frightened by this, O God, we will need assurance that this journey leads not only to Good Friday, but also to Easter's victory over Death. **SO LEAD US, GREAT CREATOR, LEAD US, O'ER THE WORLD'S TEMPESTUOUS SEA.**

Silence

We know, O God, that our world operates unjustly, and that many people experience oppression. Workers are under-valued, greed drives our commerce. It is not hard to hear the cries for justice and freedom. YET WE SHUT OUR EARS AND HUSH OUR PROTEST.

The fire burns hot in the bush, BUT WE ARE COOL IN OUR RESPONSE.

So we say Lord have mercy. CHRIST HAVE MERCY. Lord have mercy.

Assurance and Response

... In the name of Christ, I say to you: You are forgiven and you are free. THANKS BE TO GOD.

The Theme Prayer:

God of Lenten journey and Easter vision, by calling Moses, you set in motion the liberation of the Hebrews from Egypt. By firing the mind and heart of Jesus with a spirit of service and ransom, you freed the disciples from the folly of oppressing one another.

CALL US TO CULTIVATE YOUR SPIRIT WITHIN US, O GOD, THAT WE MIGHT BECOME A PART OF HOW YOU BREAK THE CHAINS AND FREE THE PEOPLE.

We pray this in the name of Jesus, using the words he gave us, together saying

OUR FATHER IN HEAVEN HALLOWED BE YOUR NAME, YOUR KINGDOM COME, YOUR WILL BE DONE, ON EARTH AS IN HEAVEN. GIVE US TODAY OUR DAILY BREAD. FORGIVE US OUR SINS AS WE FORGIVE THOSE WHO SIN AGAINST US. SAVE US FROM THE TIME OF TRIAL AND DELIVER US FROM EVIL. FOR THE KINGDOM, THE POWER AND THE GLORY ARE YOURS NOW AND FOR EVER. AMEN.

Saunoamaali'i Dr Karanina Sumeo



As she retired from her role as New Zealand's Equal Employment Opportunities Commissioner, Saunomaali'i Dr Karanina Sumeo was interviewed (30 November 2024) by Marama T-Pole on the TVNZ programme, Tagata Pasifika.

Marama: We're looking at the RSE scheme. Still, changes need to be done there. Dr Karanina: Yeah, lots of changes need to be done . . . One of the things I'm concerned about is, for example, the ability to charge higher rents. Yeah, I've been in some of those houses with people paying out a120 / 150 a week to share a room with four others. You wouldn't do that to a normal New Zealander, right? Marama: It's a tough one, right, because our relatives, our family in the islands want to come here for the RSE. But this is exploitation; it's modern-day slavery. **Dr Karanina**: It is, it is modern day slavery, and I've gone to the United Nations and lobbied for other countries to call on New Zealand to establish modern slavery legislation . . . It's also an issue that's affecting our Asian and our other migrant brothers and sisters who've come in service of this country. **Marama:** It's crazy that it's happening here and now today in New Zealand. **Dr Karanina**: Well, it bursts the myth that we are a fair and equal society. It also bursts the myth of how New Zealand talks about the Pacific as our cousins . . . We have a reality that we need to face. And I am wanting our Pacific nations to stand up and demand dignity, and the right of people who come from the Pacific - we're not just here as commodities to be used then cast out when they're not needed.
