WELCOME TO KNOX

Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. We aim to create Christian community in which people of all ages, sexual orientations, cultural backgrounds and socio-economic situations are included as equally valued participants in our congregational life. We cherish our diversity, offering a safe place of belonging to any who wish to explore their beliefs in an atmosphere promoting discussion, the development of healthy relationships and spiritual growth. We take care to use inclusive language in our services. References to God in traditional prayers and hymns may sometimes be gender-specific. As we pray and sing together, you're invited to adapt the words we've chosen.

When we pray the Lord's Prayer, you are welcome to use the language that is most natural to you.

Tēnā koutou katoa,

As many of you will know, Pope Francis, the first Latin American leader of the Roman Catholic Church, died on Monday after suffering ill health for some time.

Pope Francis was well known around the world, and is remembered for his compassion for the poor, his warmth, his promotion of peace, his concern for the marginalised, and for his humility. He encouraged the church to be welcoming and hospitable to people. We give thanks for his strong Christian witness.

It is rather poignant that he died just after Easter Sunday, when he was able to travel around St Peter's Square in his popemobile after bestowing his blessing for the city and the world. Resurrection day was celebrated.

As preparations are made for his funeral and for the process of electing a new Pope, we keep in our prayers our brothers and sisters in the Catholic faith and all those that mourn at this time.
