Knox Church is a congregation within the Presbyterian Church of Aotearoa New Zealand. 
The Call to Worship:

Having so recently remembered the lives lost and sacrifices made in the great wars of the past.

We remember the numerous wars around the world at this time and lament the lives lost and despair at the seemingly unstoppable violence.

Natural empathy is discouraged in a competitive world.

Justice is understood as punishment rather than rehabilitation and 'closure' is sought through vengeance and retribution.



Following the service, morning tea and coffee are served in the church.

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
