
- Toiletries for teenage boys and girls

Des is driving



Des is driving his rusty 1952 Hillman Minx (then about 32 years old) up the Pakuranga Highway (over which Maurice Williamson, M.P, later famously was to suggest a great gay rainbow hung). The photo was taken by his brother's son, Peter, visiting from Northern Ireland, riding shot-gun in the family's other rather better car. For the photo, Des is smiling. I wonder whether, in the smiling, he's taking mental notes about how he's doing. He'd left Northern Ireland in the 1950s to do better. Now his nephew (a high achieving legal dude born to another high achieving legal dude) visits to see how his uncle is doing. His uncle is driving a rusty old bucket.

Des, actually, has flourished in his new environment. He's married his love. He's made a home. He's produced babies who now drive the better car past his shabby old vehicle on the Pakuranga Highway. He has nothing of which to be ashamed. This photo, however, captures him driving a rusty old bucket of bolts. I love that, captured by the "how's he doing" camera from home, he's just smiling! How am *I* doing? I smile!

When my siblings and I were little babies, we used to sit in the back seat of that same old car. If it was cold, we cuddled up into blankets - because the car had no heater. As a teen, my sister once sat on the floor, so as not to be seen riding in such an old car. It was a terrible old car, but parents who loved us used it to carry us around.

To my lover: Go, get that blanket, my love, so that we can wrap ourselves in it and be toasty warm, satisfied with what we have.

To my God: Remove from us, O God, any sense of feeling that, because our car is old and rusty, we have failed.
